# Where do refugees live and work in Sweden and how it changes with time?


### Focus of the talk


- The integration of the migrant populations in host societies may take place in multiple ways
- This talk deals with the geographies of integration or spatial assimilation
- It aims is to find out what are the most typical spatial assimilation trajectories among newly arrived migrants, referring to living and working together with Swedes

#### **Evidence base**

- Time-lagged Swedish register data on people in prime working ages
- Migrants in three major cities Stockholm, Malmö and Gothenburg are followed since arrival till 10<sup>th</sup> year in Sweden
- Sequence analysis is used to detect the most common residential and workplace histories

## Hypothesis: Residence -> Work assimilation

### **Main conclusions**

- Entering the Swedish labour market is slow to take place
- Living in non-segregated neighbourhoods is positively related to getting a job and to working in non-segregated workplaces
- None of the most common geographic integration trajectories start from the labour market success
