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

2. Policy and legislative context



National level


- Policy priority in many Member States
 - Economic considerations
 - Need for qualified labour
 - Potential resource for future international partnerships
- Specific national strategies for student attraction and retention
- Transposition of Students and Researchers Directive completed in most Member States
- Policy changes to facilitate the administrative process of immigration and improve labour market access





3. Scale of international students in the EU

2017: more than 530 000 first residence permit for education





The European Migration Network (EMN) is co-ordinated by the European Commission with National Contact Points (EMN NCPs) established in each EU Member State plus Norway.





3. Proportion of international students among MS' student population - 2016



- UK: largest proportion of international students among general student population
- In general, proportion of international students higher than that of mobile EU students

(exception: AT, CY, LT, NL)





4. Possibility to stay after completion of studies



Art. 25(1): possibility to stay for min. 9 months after completion of studies to seek employment or set up a business

- Period varies across Member States from 9 to 18 months
- Usually, permit for the purpose of seeking employment or selfemployment was issued for this period





5. Policy measures and incentives for retention



More than half of Member States adopted specific measures to retain international students, e.g.:

- Exemption from the labour market test
- Exemption from having to obtain a work permit
- Exemption from salary thresholds
- No restrictions regarding the job field





6. Initiatives of HEIs and private sector for retention



HEIs and the private sector are active in implementing initiatives to encourage retention in most Member States, e.g.:

- Career centres for advice and counselling
- Job fairs and portals for graduates
- Legal advice and counselling
- Collaboration with private companies
 - Mentorship programmes





7. Common challenges



Main challenge: insufficient language skills to enter the labour market

Other challenges:

- Competitiveness of the conditions offered on the labour market and living standards
- Cost of living (e.g. cost of housing
- Long processing times for extension of permits





8. Good practice example



Orientation year – The Netherlands

- Special residence permit 'orientation year'
- International graduates can choose to start their orientation year immediately after graduation or later (up to 3 years after graduation)
- Free access to the Dutch labour market for one year





9. Learning points



- Retention measures are mostly policy-oriented
- Seek to facilitate labour market access
- A few Member States provide additional facilitation measures
- HEIs can support retention by bridging the gap between graduation and finding employment
- Retention policies should already begin during the period of study
