
The Council of the Baltic Sea States

- provides an intergovernmental platform for regional cooperation
- Under the MFAs of the region and receives strategic guidance and priority areas from annual Summits or Ministerial meetings
 - works through networks and project based activities

CBSS Task Force against Trafficking in Human Beings: Overall Objective

- The CBSS TF-THB strives to counteract trafficking in human beings in the Baltic Sea Region and its near vicinity through preventive and protective activities
- Mandated to fight human trafficking for all forms of exploitation
- Focus on adults Expert Group on Cooperation on Children at Risk (EGCC)
- Delegates from ministry level in all CBSS Member States
- Information sharing to identify gaps and needs
- Implement joint activities and develop tools to enhance the counter trafficking work in the Region
- Emphasis on practical hands on work inhouse project implementation
 - Identify, Map, Assess Address



Main Projects and Achivements

- Trainings for Consular Staff and Diplomats 550 people trained in the Region and beyond- in cooperation with the IOM
 - Handbook for Consular Staff and Diplomats on How to Identify and Assist Victims of Trafficking
- Joint project and Study with the UNODC on Cooperation Models between Law Enforcement and Service Providers in Victim Identification and Assistance
- Regional Model Memorandum of Understanding on Cooperation between Law enforcement and Social Services in Victim Identification and Assistance
- Hard Data Study on Data Collection in the CBSS Member States
 - Implementation of the Information Campaign Safe Trip
- ---- ADSTRINGO Addressing trafficking in human beings for labour exploitation through improved partnerships, enhanced diagnostics and intensified organizational approaches



Easily accessible macro-regional snapshot which outlines the direction of counter trafficking work in our region.

 Chapters on each Member State as well as an overview of recent actions taken by the European Commission specifically the work of the EU Anti-Trafficking Coordinator.

Highlights practices and concentrates on:

- new trends
- ongoing projects
- updates to the legal and institutional framework
 - coordination mechanisms.

- Identification up in some countries- still low and very resource dependent
- Majority of victims from Europe
- Increasing internal trafficking
- Majority of identified VOTs women who have been sexually exploited
- Increased numer of men identified- labour exploitation
 - Increase of exploitation for begging



Various services avialable and offered by NGOs or state actors

Challenges:

- >Services for women victims of sexual exploitation- not for men
 >Victims not accepting assistance
- >Strong emphasis on return rather than fullfledged victim centered approach
- >Full benefits only for persons who legally reside in the country
- >Full assistance and temporary residence only to persons who are wiling to testify
- >Reflexion period not implemented



Challenges:

- >Prosecution levels low and going down- few convictions
- >Judicial system not experienced or have the right knowledge tools
- >Cooperation models between law enforcement and assistance providers in place but not formalised and often on an ad hoc basis
- >Stigmatisation and criminalistation of victims
- >Lack of compensation to victims



CBSS conference on How to Enhance Assistance to Victims in the Baltic Sea Region, Helsinki 19 March

- Arranged by the Finnish Presidency of the CBSS, the CBSS TF-THB and the EGCC-
- The main purpose of the conference was to serve as a platform for knowledge exchange on current best practices and challenges in victim assistance in the BSR
- How can adequate and rights based assistance to women, men, girls and boys best be assured
- 3 main themes; Cooperation Models and Monitoring Mechanisms, Assistance and Safe Housing and Reintegration and Return



CBSS conference on How to Enhance Assistance to Victims in the Baltic Sea Region, Helsinki 19 March

- Main conference recommendations:
- Assistance not only to formally identified victims but also to presumed and potential Victims
- >Unconditional assistance independent on cooperation with authorities
- >Exploitation an objective criteria not subjective
- >Assistance programs need to be quick, flexible and comprehensive
- Address the demand users of services
- Better guidance and identification tools for operative staff



CBSS conference on How to Enhance Assistance to Victims in the Baltic Sea Region, Helsinki 19 March

- Main conference recommendations:
- >Assistance and counselling need to be clear and realistic
- Increased cooperation and trust between actors- formalised cooperation mechanisms- National Coordination and National Rapporteurs
- ➢One stop shop
- >Return and reintegration assess best long term solutions, monitor and follow up
- Compensation to victims
- >Involve new actors in prevention and identification think outside the box
- ➢Self critique

- Joint Project with the EGCC Potentially Assessing Successful Prosecution Methods
